When making a PDF file in inDesign:

Important: Before making a PDF file, make sure your images are CMYK color mode and that your text is 100 percent black to ensure that your pdf file prints properly.

- 1. Go to File > Export.
- 2. A window should come up asking you where to save it. Select the location on your computer where you'd like your PDF to be saved.
- 3. From the pulldown menu at the bottom of this window, select Adobe PDF.
- 4. Select "Save" and proceed to the next screen.
- 5. A dialogue box will appear that has many different options. In order to make a PDF that will work best on our system, use these settings:

From inDesign CS4/CS5:

In the GENERAL tab:

- Pages Radial button that says "All" should be selected.
- Options Optimize for Fast Web View should be checked.
- Export Layers: Set to "Visible & Printable Layers", unless you have hidden layers that are not to be exported.

In the COMPRESSION tab:

Color Images:

- Bicubic Downsampling to 300 px/inch for images above 450 px/inch
- Compression = Automatic (JPEG)
- Image Quality = Maximum

Grayscale Images:

- Bicubic Downsampling to 300 px/inch for images above 450 px/inch
- Compression = Automatic (JPEG)
- Image Quality = maximum

Monochrome Images:

- Bicubic Downsampling to 1200 px/inch for images above 1800 px/inch
- Compression: CCITT Group 4
- Make sure that "Compress Text and Line Art" and "Crop Image Data to Frames" are checked.

In the MARKS AND BLEED tab:

Under Marks:

• Make sure "Crop Marks" is checked.

Type: Default

• Weight: 0.25

• Offset: 0.0833

Under Bleed:

Nothing should be checked, but the bleed setting should be as follows:

Top: 0.125, Left: 0.125, Right: 0.125, Bottom: 0.125

In the ADVANCED Tab:

• Subset fonts when percent of characters used is less than 100%

OPI: Nothing should be checked in this area.

6. Create your PDF file.
